## From the President

In the last issue I talked about what the Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) does for our archery/bowhunting family. This month I want to share how the VBA operates.

Who runs the VBA? Obviously I serve as the President, it is really our affiliated clubs who run the VBA. Article 4 of our Constitution establishes a Director position for each affiliated club. So your club representative that you send to VBA meetings is a Director of the VBA. Together with the other club Director's and the elected officers, they make up our VBA Board of Directors. Our Constitution charges the Directors are with controlling and managing the activities, policy and property of the VBA. They have the power to make By-laws, and establish or change tournament procedures. They can establish the amount of dues for members of the VBA, make leases or contracts on behalf of the VBA, and do other things they deem necessary or proper. They approve the annual shoot card, and the location of the State level tournaments that the VBA sponsors. It is the Directors that approve any changes in shooting styles or rules that are followed for card shoots at your local clubs. In short, they establish the policies that we operate under across the Commonwealth.

For those who might think that the elected officers control the voting on the many issues brought before the VBA Board of Directors, it is just the opposite. Your club Director's vote is weighted by the number of club members you have registered with the VBA. This rule was established by the Directors to recognize that larger clubs represent many more archers, and have a larger stake in the outcome. Therefore their vote should carry more weight. This ensures that it is the club Directors who control the majority of the votes on any issue, not the elected officers. Thus, if your club wants to recommend a change to the VBA policies and procedures, your representative must convince other club Director's that it has merit and should be supported. If your club Director is successful, the change is approved and implemented at all VBA clubs!

After each VBA meeting, your club representative brings back issues and proposed changes for consideration by your membership. Take time to listen as they are presented, and make your opinion known in your club meetings! If you have ideas you feel would benefit your club and the other VBA clubs, discuss them with your club's representative, and your club membership. Then have your club representative bring them back to the VBA Board of Directors for consideration by the other member clubs.

So now you know how the VBA operates and how you can introduce new ideas that can positively influence the VBA. I can assure you that we are always looking for ways to improve, and you can make a difference! Get involved in your local club and the VBA!

## From the Executive Vice President

Hope all is well with everyone and by the time you read this archery hunting season is well under way and I hope you have had to rent cooler space to hang all of your deer. Most of you know about the law changes but just in case you have been in hiding and don't know about the changes I will give you a brief recap, the mandatory CWD testing days have been expanded to include all of Frederick, Shenandoah, Clarke and Warren counties, this means that all deer taken in those counties on the first two Saturdays of rifle season must be taken to test sites in each county so they can take samples from each deer to check for CWD. Now onto the bear tag issue, the VGDIF has removed the bear tag from your regular big game tag and you now have to purchase a separate tag at \$21 for residents and \$151 for nonresidents. The last new law change I am going to talk about is the use of natural deer attractants is now illegal, any scent coming from a deer itself whether it be a urine or gland scent cannot be used anymore and you cannot have it on your person while you are in the woods hunting for deer and that includes walking from you vehicle to your stand or back to your vehicle. You can however use synthetic scents but the container must say on it that it is a synthetic.

I would also like to remind you that tree stand safety is a must, always use your tree stand safety harness when you're up a tree, I am pretty certain you don't bounce very well from 15 feet up a tree and the higher you go up the less you will bounce. After you get your trophies out of the woods take some photos and send them to me so I can find a spot in the next issue of *Flight* to show them off.

Thanks to all of the clubs that hosted the VBA state championship shoots this year, I didn't make it to all of them this year but I will try to do better next year.

Next year is the VBA's 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary and the VBA is already starting to roll out 75<sup>th</sup> logo cups and stickers and are looking into tee shirts and possibly knives for next year to celebrate the anniversary. The State Championship awards for next year will be an acrylic plaque with your name and the style and age class you won engraved in it that will be handed out at the 2017 VBA banquet, these can't be handed out at the state shoots because of the engraving and we will have them all engraved at the same time. These plaques are a one year award and will reflect the 75<sup>th</sup> logo on it.

### Agenda Item at September Meeting;

#7 VBA Constitution, Art. 13 ,Shooting Styles, Add; Section 13.8, Traditional-Non Mechanical Release; Recurves or Longbows only. Non-mechanical release aid with bowstring hook that does not mechanically swivel to release the bowstring or release aid loop at the shot. A release aid loop is allowed. Written memoranda are allowed. There will be no class breakdown for this shooting style. Shooting divisions will include Male and Female. Failed, 27 No, 11 Yes.

### Agenda Item for January Meeting;

#1. Motion to add a known 45 women's class and a known 50 men's class to the VBA State Level 3-D shoots. Justification; The known classes are the fastest growing classes in 3-D and offers an opportunity for archers that do not shoot 3-D's, due to abilities in yardage judging, having a class to compete in. Effective January, 2017.

## From the Hunting Vice President

As another 3D archery season ends another bow season begins, I find that with all my efforts to be prepared I still have a laundry list of things to do. I can only guess there are many of you that are in the same boat. At least I don't have to work on my bow or stands. All the shooting and practice for 3D all summer long has kept my equipment and shooting skills sharp. The switch over to fixed blade broadheads, Montec's to be exact, came with little effort. For those of you having problems making the switch to fixed blade broadheads, a quick search of the ol' internet will give you some helpful tips on things to try to get them on target. I find the biggest change I have is when shooting at 40 yards or more. I get a bigger drop with broadheads than I do with field points. A quick adjustment to the sight pin and things are good again.

For those cringing at the thought of me shooting broadheads at 40 yards or more, don't get overly excited. I practice out to 50 yards and limit my hunting distance to 30 yards for deer and bear. Too many things have to go right when they are further than that and I just don't want to take the chance.

I represented the VBA at the DGIF Deer Management SAC committee this year. It is a ten year plan that helps guide the DGIF as they manage our deer herd here in Virginia. It will be presented to the DGIF Board for adoption during the month of October. It was the 3<sup>rd</sup> Deer Management plan and it will be in effect for 10 years. The plan was a collaboration of many segments and interests through-out the state. Take the time to read it. It can be found on the DGIF website. I am also representing the VBA in another Organization. It is the Virginia Wildlife Habitat Coalition (VWHC). Their mission: The Virginia Wildlife Habitat Coalition actively supports through advocacy and education the stewardship and active management of our forest resources, based on sound science for the benefit of all wildlife. The coalition works collaboratively to provide input and support for habitat projects for both game and nongame species in the George Washington/Jefferson National Forest and the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries Wildlife Management Areas. Anyone interested in or having comment on the VWHC please contact me.

All of you should know of the many changes to the hunting seasons in Virginia this year. We are seeing many changes that range from a new style Game Laws digest, to only synthetic scents for deer. Since I mentioned the Game Laws digest please get it and READ it. Reading it might keep you out of trouble. The Bear license has been separated from the Big Game license and will cost you \$21.00 now. The Game Law digest contains information on public access lands and draw hunts for youth, waterfowl, deer and other type hunts. Also, from my last column I need to make a correction about the PALs Program. The change to remove the wording Private Lands from the PALS program, is to allow Public lands to be managed under the PALS Program. I was told that some of the lands in PALs may allow Sunday hunting if designated by the Land Owner.

I can't leave y'all without mentioning, our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Banquet will be April 2<sup>nd</sup> 2016. Take the time to pen it in your schedules.

Please everyone take the time to be safe, as well as, a great steward for our sport and passion. And I hope to see you all at the banquet and on the ranges next spring.



# Firewood

I am very lucky and blessed to be able to write this article to accompany the game photos from my July 2015 South African hunt. Believe me when I say that my success is not something which I would be able to share with the VBA membership without massive amounts of support from all around me. This adventure was planned a year in advance and it is hard to believe it is over, but I have collected some of the best firewood for old age (that is a South African saying for making great memories).

There is no way to effectively prepare yourself for 20+ hours of flying to get to South Africa from Virginia, not to mention the travel from the airport in Johannesburg to the final destination of the outfitter. Any way you slice it that's an extremely long flight to sign up for, so make sure you're in the right mindset to take on the first step of the journey. Honestly, the first step is similar to any planned hunt in the Old Dominion or any of her 49 sisters. To the best of your ability, be ready and able to execute if, and when, the opportunity presents itself. This started early in my preparation getting out on the range, shooting in the backyard, joining an indoor league during winter, doing research, making sure your equipment is in working order and familiar to you. I have been so fortunate to make some great new friends over the past year and a half of shooting with my fellow archers at Massanutten Archery Club, other local clubs, and attending VBA events. Doing Archery with more experienced and skilled folks challenges you, and makes you want to be a better shooter. I have made friendships with folks which will last a lifetime, and I am so thankful for all of the tips/tricks/lessons and general feedback you get from quality time with other archers and hunters.

Earlier I said this was a "Planned" hunt. If you have ever taken yourself out of your normal element & environment and gone after game which you are not raised on, you know that plans need to change. If you have never taken on the adventure to go outside your comfort zone (and have a desire) I recommend you keep an open mind. The outfitters are locals, and the folks you need to listen to if you want to have an optimal experience. What works for you at home may not be the best tactic on the other side of the planet. Not to mention, South Africa is not the most stable community, and your guide can keep you from getting into trouble.

I knew I was going to be declaring my independence during winter in the southern hemisphere. It was 30-40 degrees in the AM and warmed up quickly to 60-70 degrees in the South African dry season. It was dry and dustier than I could have imagined, but the western zone camo I purchased helped me to blend in well for spot and stalks in the field. The required long underwear in the AMs quickly made it to my pack by lunchtime each day. In addition to the spot and stalks, the plan was to additionally spend a lot of time in ground blinds to be able to execute with a bow on some of these African animals. I was ready with a black hat and shirts as well.

For me this was a hunt of a lifetime. I didn't know if I would ever have the opportunity to make it back to Africa for another hunting adventure. With that said, I had a list of animals which I wanted to go after (and pay for), but I quickly woke up and became opportunistic and listened to my guide regarding the game and opportunities which presented themselves. I thought I would just be saying, "no thanks, that is not on the list." But the list is not a menu and you don't have the luxury of controlling your situation. As many of you know, whether in Africa or Virginia, that's hunting.

In addition to the archery equipment, you have to have a camera ready. There are 30-40 hunt-able species in South Africa, and I was targeting four. I got some great photos of animals which I did not hunt, took home a few animals I had no plans to hunt, and got very close to some game I never thought I would be remotely close to. My camera got pulled out more than my arrows.

The first animal I took was a kudu on a spot and stalk. The kudu was the only animal that I got a second arrow opportunity on. The impala, as with the rest of the animals on the hunt, were taken from a "hide" (South African for blind). These animals tend to run in groups and there are way too many eyes for my liking when you are trying to execute. You should expect that is how it will go

down. The baboon was a “throw in” for the outfitter as they have big problems with these animals and they want them gone. The waterbuck is the animal I was most excited about hunting before I left Linden, and it 100% lived up to my expectations. I made a less than perfect shot on the blesbok, and boy did I have to pay for that. It was a 3+ mile blood spoor (Afrikaans for track/trail/print), but we finally retrieved him very late into the evening. I was super impressed with the toughness of these adversaries, and they all seem to have an ability to keep going when they should have expired. Getting the opportunity on the blue wildebeest was an “add-on” outside of the plan, and I am sure I would’ve regretted not trying once the opportunity came. Their name is accurate, as they are “beasts”. The final animal on my list was a gemsbok. I didn’t have an opportunity for a bow shot on a gemsbok the entire trip, and on the last day I borrowed a buddies 7MM, and was lucky enough to get a shot on one at 156 yards. That’s as close as I was able to get to one of those animals, but he was on “the list,” so I felt obligated to bring one back even if that meant I had to put the bow down. I love my Mathews, but it’s not gonna get er’ done at 150+ yards.

I mentioned all of the folks who support me, and I would be remiss if I did not take a moment to call them out here. Thank you Massanutten Archery Club for making me more passionate about our sport and making me feel like a real part of the family. Thanks VBA for all of the coordination with the many great clubs and events in our state. The boys at Coal Run Hunting Lodge are always there for me and support my continued improvement in the field. Additionally, I have so much respect for Feron and all the folks at Hoffman Archery who have supported all of my equipment needs as well as stupid questions (I ask a lot of them). Thanks Feron for making me confident on each arrow I release. Most of all I have to thank my AMAZING wife Heather. Heather is my rock, and even though she does not have an interest in hunting or archery, she is super supportive of my passions and tolerant of all of the time I spend pursuing these interests. I am very lucky and blessed.

“Dankie” (Afrikaans for thank you), and good luck out there!!!



## Wally and Winnie's Buck BBQ

- 2-3 pounds of venison roast
- 3 TBSP olive oil
- 1 TBSP garlic powder
- ½ TBSP dried oregano
- ½ TBSP dried sweet basil
- 1TBSP black pepper
- ½ cup diced onion
- ½ Cup water

Heat olive oil in crockpot on high. Add spices and onions and stir. Roll roast in oil mixture until coated. Add ½ cup water and cook for 1 hour on high. Turn roast and cook on low 5 hours until meat falls apart. Keep moisture to a minimum. Add BBQ sauce of your choice and cook on low for additional 1 hour.



## **ORDER OF THE GOLDEN FEATHER**

### **NOMINATIONS DUE IN MARCH**

The VBA Order of the Golden Feather was created to honor those persons who have given unselfishly of their time and talents toward the betterment of archery and archers. Recipients are persons who possess the virtues of sportsmanship, character, morals, integrity and friendship. As a reflection of the substance for membership, only 80 people have been elected to the Order in the past 71 years.

To be qualified, a candidate must be member in good standing of the VBA at the time of nomination, must have a minimum of ten successive years' membership in the VBA and must be sponsored by three VBA members of good standing or by a VBA Club.

This article is a reminder that candidates must be submitted to the Board of Directors at the March meeting for this year. Nominations must be in writing and be signed by sponsoring individuals or a Club officer. Successful nominees have always performed duties or had an impact outside their immediate club.

Details can be found in Article 16 of the VBA By-Laws.
