## From the NFAA Director

### **Mid-Atlantic Annual Meeting**

I attended the Mid-Atlantic Annual Meeting in Watkins Glen, New York, on June 17, 1995. The meeting was called to order by Councilman Mike LePera at 8:00 p.m.

All seven Mid-Atlantic States were represented. Also present was Ron West, the Mid-Atlantic Pro Representative. No agenda items were presented for consideration.

The first item discussed was the 1996 Mid-Atlantic Indoor. Motions were made for one 300 round and two 300 rounds. Having no direction from our membership, I voted for one, but two rounds prevailed.

Bids for the Indoor were received from clubs in New York, New Jersey and Maryland. The tournament will be held at two locations: Tuscarora Archers, Frederick, Maryland and Wo-Pe-Na Archers, Clifton, New Jersey. Dates are **March 2 and 3, 1996**. Shooting may start on Friday, March 1 if the host club so desires. Registration is \$25 and the cut-off date is February 15. After that date, an additional late registration fee of \$10 will apply.

Bids for the Mid-Atlantic Outdoor were received from three clubs, one of which was in Canada. The tournaments will be hosted by two clubs – Garden State Archers and Black Knight Bowbenders, located about seven miles apart. They are near New Egypt, New Jersey and Jackson, New Jersey. Dates are **June 22 and 23, 1996**.

Without direction from our club directors, I voted for 28 Field the first

successful at bowfishing this year and harvested either or both, then get those applications in. Can't understand why no one wants to apply, there's no charge and I know a lot of folks are out there bowfishing.

Are you ready for deer season to open? Seems almost any day now. In fact, by the time you read this, we will probably be hunting. Last year was a lean one for me, so I'm hoping for a radical change of luck this year. Actually, I think I really just need to spend more time in the woods. I didn't hunt much last year, and from my experience it is day and 14 Hunter and 14 Animal the second day. This failed. Archers will shoot 28 Field and 14 Animals the first day, and 28 Hunter the second day. The 28 Field and 14 Animals will be shot straight through with no break. Registration fee is \$25 and the cut-off date is June 1. After that date, a late fee of an additional \$10 will apply. Participants will pick up their score cards at 7:00 a.m., assembly will be at 7:30 a.m., and shooting is to commence at 8:00 a.m.

The next Mid-Atlantic meeting is tentatively scheduled for 8:00 p.m. on Friday, June 21 before the start of the 1996 Mid-Atlantic Outdoor.

The new Mid-Atlantic Pro Representative is Ron West, 190 54th Street, SE, Washington, DC 20019. Ron's home phone number is 202-584-8015, and his mobile phone is 202-520-1744. When we have a State tournament and pros shoot, information on pro points is to be sent to Ron.

There were 255 shooters registered at Watkins Glen for the 1995 Mids. I was advised that there were 469 registered for the NFAA 3-D held in Parkersburg, West Virginia. Marvin Waymack, Great Lakes Councilman, was appointed and served as Tournament Director in Parkersburg. Since the tournament was held in the Mid-Atlantic Section, Mike LePera, Councilman, should have been appointed to this position. He is going to lodge a formal protest with the NFAA President, the other Council-

men, and all Directors.

The meeting adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

Pam Shilling resigned as Executive Secretary of NFAA effective September 7, 1995. The position has been advertised with a proposed starting salary of \$25,000.

On August 30, President Crowell held a conference call with the Councilmen. I received a copy of notes of this meeting from Councilman Mike LePera, and what I assume are the official minutes of the same conference call from President Crowell.

It was significant, in my opinion, to note that Executive Secretary Pam Shilling was not included in the conference call, since she was still an employee and could have been called on for her opinion in the matters under discussion.

Pam has volunteered to help run NFAA National Tournaments and as a result of this, a motion was made and passed to have her assist with the NFAA Indoor and IFAA Indoor Tournaments being held in March 1996. I understand she will receive expenses.

A motion was made to have her assist with the NFAA Outdoor also, but the motion failed, with President Crowell casting the tie-breaking vote. (Registration is not one of the required duties of the Executive Secretary.)

President Crowell proposed the establishment of an NFAA shooters school via a detailed letter. Councilman LePera voted against the school because he felt there were too many unanswered questions, and also because he felt the Directors should have voted on this matter. Some of the unanswered questions were: who and how many instructors; what should be their qualifications; what and how will the subjects be taught; how far might an instructor be asked to travel; what are expense limits, etc. 4<sup>x</sup>

Well, the outdoor tournament season is winding down and many of the VBA members are putting on their camos, grabbing a treestand and heading for the woods. Personally, I'm looking forward to spending some time in the woods trying to put my tag on a trophy whitetail.

Hopefully, many of you will be successful in taking game this season. I encourage you to send me photos for publication in the *Flight*. While we're talking about photos, I would like to share some tips with you on how to take a good success picture of you and your game. The information on successful photo taking is furnished with permission from Hoyt USA. These are the same techniques Hoyt staff shooters use when they head into the woods.

## The Secrets of Bowhunter-Success Photographs from



The best quality bowhunter-success photographs exhibit four essential ingredients:

- A. the ANIMAL
- B. the BOWHUNTER
- C. the ARCHERY EQUIPMENT used
- D. the NATURAL SETTING

Each of these ingredients is vitally important. Each is completely necessary. None can be slighted, overlooked or left out. The secret to taking top quality bowhunter-success photographs is to carefully and precisely blend these four key ingredients into each and every success photograph.

### A. Presenting the Animal

The animal must be the ultimate center of interest in the photo. It is, after all, the animal that has made the moment so very special. Without the animal, the very reason for the photo ceases to exist. Basically, everything that you do in posing all four essential ingredients in the photo should be an attempt to make the animal the respected center of interest. The hunter, the archery equipment used and even the natural setting are all of secondary importance to the animal.

To achieve this effect, certain guidelines can be followed.

1) Place the animal so that it is in the approximate center of the photo.

2) Position the hunter so that he or she does not steal the show. In most cases the hunter should be posed behind the animal. Special care should be taken to position the hunter "on a level" close to the animal's own. This means not posing the hunter standing upright over a stretched out buck. In that case, the towering hunter, and not the animal, probably will become the photograph's center of interest. Rather, the hunter should be posed kneeling, squatting or sitting behind the animal. This projects the animal to the forefront making it the chief, and proper, center of interest.

3) The camera should be placed on the same level as the animal. Consider the situation of a six-foot tall photographer standing upright, but photographing a hunter with an animal posed quite naturally on the ground. In this case, the camera will be shooting down on the scene, presenting an unflattering view of both the animal and the hunter. Photographing down on a trophy has the undesirable effect of making the animal appear less significant and smaller than it actually may be.

An excellent rule to follow is to place the camera on approximately the same level as the animal's eyes. Such an eye level presentation tends to show the trophy in its most respectful and flattering manner. To do this, the camera can be placed on a low tripod (more on self time/tripod shots later) or with a photographer who is kneeling, crouching or maybe even lying on his or her stomach to take the shot.

4) In addition to making the animal the flattering center of interest in the photograph, the animal must also be presented in a pleasing manner. Blood, gaping wounds and hanging tongues are offensive and totally destroy an otherwise top quality hunter success photo. In setting up the photograph, take little extra time to clean up the trophy. Wash away all blood. Either tuck the loose tongue back into the mouth, or simply cut it off and discard. Even bloody arrows should be cleaned or removed from the photograph. You'll have a tough time finding much, if any, blood on any of the hunter-success photos in Hoyt's catalog or advertising. We all know it was there, but careful cleaning or covering up does the trick.

5) Extreme care must also be taken to pose the animal in a respectful and natural manner. Any special hunting trophy was first a very special animal and should be treated as such. Position the animal so that its best features are highlighted and so that its body positions, and particularly its head, are quite naturally displayed.

6) When taking the photograph, focus on the animal's eyes. It was those eyes that gave him life and will continue to give him interest in your photograph. Eyes, however, can be a problem. Quite soon after the animal dies, the eyes will begin to dry and glaze over. Glazed eyes make for a very unnatural photograph. Fortunately, the solution is simple. Using the tip of your finger, gently apply a dab of your own spit directly to the dried eyes. This will restore the wet, lifelike look.

#### **B.** Presenting the Hunter

As has already been stressed, the hunter must be of secondary importance in the photograph. Nothing in the hunter's pose, posture, gaze or attitude should detract from the animal.

The hunter should be posed in hunting clothing. Striped golf shirts and dress slacks are definitely out. Camo, wool or whatever you wear when seriously hunting is in. Often the hunter will need to clean or straighten up before the photo is taken. Knock off some of the mud, tuck in the shirt, tip the hat back. Hunter-success photos are more acceptable without face paint. If possible, remove face paint for your photos.

It should also be noted that for top quality hunter-success photos, the hunter does not always have to look directly at the camera. Gazing at the animal is often as pleasing as at the camera.

C. Presenting the Archery Equipment Used

Bowhunters everywhere are naturally interested in identifying the type of equipment used by successful bowhunters. The bow should be shown clearly, but is best shown almost casually or incidentally in the photograph. It may be held by the hunter or artfully placed on or against the animal – provided it does not detract from the animal.

### D. Presenting the Natural Setting

The natural setting is the key ingredient that ties all of the other ingredients together. The setting can, and usually does, make or break most hunter-success photographs. The only acceptable setting is a completely natural one.

In practically all cases, the best hunter-success photographs are taken at or very near the actual kill site. Sometimes, if necessary and possible, the trophy can be moved to more favorable site. Almost anything works as long as it is completely natural. Hunter-success photos should never be taken in garages, on driveways, in pickup truck beds, or on front lawns. Even in natural settings, extreme care must be taken to ensure that telephone poles, power lines, buildings, vehicles, onlookers, fences, roads, or anything else man-made does not appear, even distantly, in the photograph.

Suggestions on Cameras and Film

Get in the habit of carrying a camera at all times while hunting. Cameras left at home cannot take photos. A small belt pack, fanny pack or daypack can easily pack a camera and a few rolls of film.

Today's cameras are genuine wonders. You can spend hundreds of dollars or stay well within a strict budget and still obtain excellent photographic results. 35mm cameras are definitely the way to go. 110 Instamatics are not acceptable.

The fastest growing camera trend today is toward the auto-focus. autoadvance, auto-load, auto-everything cameras. Such point and shoot cameras are rapidly proving their dependability to hunters. They leave little to chance and typically produce excellent quality photographs. Down that big trophy, carefully arrange the four essential ingredients and then let the camera do the rest. Point and shoot.

Cameras and the Solo Hunter

Bowhunters often hunt alone. But hunting alone does not have to handicap the individual who desires to take immediate hunter-success photographs. The task can be conveniently accomplished with a tripod and selftimer. The tripod holds the camera in place for the shot, and the self-timer actually takes the photo on an automatic time delayed basis after the hunter presets the camera and then walks over to the trophy to get in the shot.

### **Relax and Smile!**

Hunter-success photographs are used to show that you are <u>happy</u>. A smile, your particular smile, does that better than almost anything else. Look pleased. Look happy. Relax and thoroughly enjoy the moment. Everyone has a different smile. Some smiles show lots of teeth. Others don't. Shoot a trophy and smile your smile.



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## Report from the Bowhunting Committee

## VBA to Host Second Annual Awards Banquet

The VBA has announced that its second annual Awards Banquet will be held Saturday, March 30, 1996 at the Mount Vernon Best Western Motel in Charlottesville.

More than 60 persons attended the first banquet last year and the event in March promises to be even more successful.

"The banquet is an outstanding evening that brings VBA members and their spouses together in a social setting to enjoy themselves and to honor members who have been fortunate enough to win awards," said Bob Seltzer, VBA Hunting Vice President.

Awards are presented to the VBA members who harvest the largest buck by weight and the largest doe by weight. A request to be considered for the award should be sent to Bob Seltzer. A copy of the game tag that provides details of the harvest and the weight should accompany the request.

Also presented is an award to the person who harvests the largest rack as measured by the Virginia system, which allows the rack to be measured while still green. Requests to be considered for the largest rack award should be sent to Bob and must be accompanied by the score sheet, which can be completed by anyone certified to score the rack (most taxidermists and game wardens).

The deadline for receipt of all weight and rack entries is February 29, 1996.


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In addition to the awards, the banquet will feature a display of animals, door prizes, raffle prizes and a prominent guest speaker who has been invited but not yet accepted.

The cost of the event is not yet finalized, but is expected to be the same as last year – \$20 per person or \$35 for a couple. Included is the meal and setups for drinks. Attendees provide their own bottle. Tickets will go on sale in January.

"We hope to receive several entries in each award category," Seltzer said. "I know there were larger animals harvested last year than our winning entries. This year we hope our members will take advantage of the opportunity and submit their potential winners as soon as they are harvested."





## *Tips from "The Old Bowhunter": How to Practice*

- Any target, straw, or fabric or sand, sawdust or styrofoam which will stop yet protect broadheads is fine. Fine grain sand bank is ideal as it stops broadheads well, and an outline of game animal can be drawn on it for a target.
- Place target in wooded area where possible.
- Use the same arrows and broadheads with which you intend to hunt if target is suitable. Otherwise, use comparable weight blunts or field points.
- Always use an unmarked outline of a deer as your target. Very lightly sketch in the lung and heart area.
- Shoot for one spot on the deer, not at a deer.
- Once you can hit the target at 30 yards and less, make it a rule not to take more than one practice shot from one spot. It is the first shot that counts. You probably won't get the second.
- Shoot from behind trees and shrubs, down on one knee and both knees, with bow canted left and right, and standing on your tiptoes to shoot over a limb.
- Wear the clothes and equipment you'll be hunting in when you practice.

- Set up a tree stand and using a shooting-safety line, shoot in every possible direction and at every possible angle. Mark the distances from the tree stand to your target if this is your normal practice.
- Set up a target near a low building and shoot at it from different places on the roof.



- Practice year-round, if you can, by bowfishing, varmint hunting, and stump shooting.
- Practice in the early morning and late evening light and in all weather conditions.
- Set up an action archery course using plastic jugs and rubber blunts. This is easily done in a limited space and gives a variety of shots.
- If you use a sight, zero it in at a given distance (I use 20 yards). When you get good, you can figure how much lower or higher you hold that same sight to shoot at 12 yards or at 30 yards.


